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THE APRIL MEETING

Dave Metzgar will do a demonstration regarding Styling/Secondary and Tertiary Wiring.



Bob Grealish will demonstrate and discuss the reasons and

timing of pinching pines and elongating species. (This will be dependent on the growth of the trees and may need to be postponed until May.)

We will plan on doing 2-4 merit-based critiques of the members trees. If you have a tree that is in a bonsai pot and you have attempted to style it through pruning and/or wiring, your tree is eligible to be presented. We will attempt to do these merit-based critiques at each meeting and we have two meetings fully focused on merit-based critiques.

Please send an email with your request and a photo of the tree you wish to present. We will contact the members whose trees have been selected for each meeting. Only one tree per member and we will try to ensure each member has a chance to present at least one tree throughout the year. The officers will randomly select the trees. We will let you know to bring your tree in before the meeting. If pinching elongated species is postponed because of timing of growth, we will do more merit-based critiques.

A Note From Mike:

At our last meeting there was a question about what members of PBS get for their dues. This is particularly salient for those who are considering joining for the first time. The major benefit of our society is to give members a place to gather with others who are interested in bonsai so that we can enjoy our shared past time and learn from one another how to successfully grow our trees. We could just meet and talk without ever spending any money, of



course. But to provide the best opportunities to learn and share costs money, and it is your right as members to know what expenses your dues are covering.

The rental of the space we use for meetings costs around \$900 per year. It would take 30 members to cover that cost alone. Our other major expenses are the spring show, the two professionals we hire to run workshops, materials for our field tree operation, supplies for use during meetings and our picnic. These costs add up to more than \$6000. It would take 200 members to pay for these costs. We do earn income from various sources, and we ask members who participate in the workshops, which not all members can attend, to pay a fee that is nevertheless subsidized by the club. These reduce our net costs so that most years we spend about what we have received.

There is a lot of value for you as a member in these activities. All of them offer different ways to enjoy and learn about bonsai. And these activities further the club's mission which is "... to bring together at frequent intervals, those who are interested in the art of Bonsai. To disseminate knowledge, encourage others and generally create interest and exchange information in the art of Bonsai through lectures and demonstrations." We hope \$30/year is worth it to you for all the learning and activities. But if not, please let us know and get involved. This is your society as much as anyone else's!

Merit-Based Critiques

We carefully and thoughtfully grow, trim, prune, wire, and pinch trees as we enjoy the process as well as seeing what we create. We also enjoy the opportunity to share our trees with others so that they can appreciate them. Our Bonsai Show is probably our most anticipated event not just to see others' trees but to present ones of our own creation.

It is not uncommon, and I include myself in this, that when someone shows us their tree, no matter how well the design was executed, we tend to want to talk specifically about what's wrong with the tree. So, the comment is made along the lines of "That's an amazing tree, I really like it but the one thing about it that I would change is.....". Another version is the individual will ask you permission such as "Would you mind, or would it be all right if I made a suggestion?"

Though these comments appear to be compliments and/or are designed to be helpful they are generally not experienced that way by the receiver. It's very possible that the specific problem that you are commenting on or the adjustment you will suggest may be a specific feature that the creator likes. Speaking from experience I have received negative comments about a feature that I have embraced in a tree. I have also delivered negative comments about a feature the owner had embraced.

So, how should we approach other people's trees. I would suggest that when we comment on members tree make specific comments and limit it to what we like. Most owners have spent effort and time to create their trees. If members bring a tree to the meeting or a show and are not specifically asking for advice, then don't give it.

If you want to comment, then be specific. Don't just say that is a nice tree. Tell them what you like about the tree and stop. Don't add, "Can I give you one suggestion?" Regardless of the level of the individual and their artistic endeavor they have spent time and effort to get the tree to where it is. Focusing on the good qualities reinforces what they have accomplished and will motivate them to continue to go forward. Moreover, if you have a desire to share with them what could improve the tree, the positive attitude may open the door for them to ask. Wait for them to ask.

bonsai the officers have agreed that we will be adding to our Thursday night program 2-4 merit-based critiques of members trees. Members who submit the tree are willing to allow members to identify the merits of the tree and then later identify areas that could improve the tree.

These critiques will last between 5 and 10 minutes. In the first part of the critique any member can give one positive feature that they find attractive in the composition. Once the audience has exhausted the merits of the tree, those members who have made a positive comment are allowed one comment on what could be done to improve the tree. Members who have not offered a positive comment will have to wait to the next critique for their opportunity to participate.

Members can submit a styled tree in a bonsai pot by sending in a request to mstern55@outlook.com. We will plan to critique 2-4 trees in an evening. The current criteria to bring in a tree for a merit-based critique is that it be in a bonsai pot and the owner has styled the tree. This is not a program to obtain advice for raw or unstyled material.

The officers would like to encourage a culture in the Pittsburgh Bonsai Society where we focus on specific qualities that are attractive in the trees that the members bring to the meetings and the show. Saying that is a nice tree is a start. But it is not sufficient. Teasing out the details of what makes that a nice tree helps improve your artistic eye and improves your approach to your trees. It reinforces specific efforts the owner has made and motivates them to want to continue. It also encourages inexperienced members with less refined trees to show their trees, too stick with their efforts and remain active members. We primarily do bonsai for enjoyment and to feel good. Let's embrace that!

The idea is that you open your garden to the society for a few hours on an evening. During this time, members can see your trees, ask questions, take photos, learn, and get ideas for their own trees.



The Pittsburgh Bonsai Society, formed in 1957, is a non-profit organization. The mission: to disseminate knowledge, encourage others and create interest in the art of bonsai.

Field Day at Grealish's

The Pittsburgh Bonsai Society established its growing field at the Grealish homestead in approximately 2014. The primary purpose of the field was to ensure that there was available quality plant material for workshops that are scheduled approximately twice a vear. It is difficult to find material that can be utilized for creating bonsai. The Society brings in professionals for workshops to educate and assist members with styling for which this material is utilized. The trees are sold to members on a lottery basis. The proceeds are utilized by the Society to purchase replacement stock, mulch, land scape fabric, pots and potting medium such as pumice and other necessary supplies related to the care of these trees. The financial goal is to make the field selfsustaining. We do not want to lose money on this endeavor. Therefore, the field has a separate line-item budget which will be monitored by our Treasurer, Ed Baginski. The educational goal is to teach members how to care for field grown stock and collect it. The timing and care of these trees is similar to trees in bonsai pots.

Dave Metzger, our Field Director organized and coordinated our first 2022 field day education experience. Approximately 35 field grown Trident Maples and dwarf Chinese Elms were dug from the field and then provided aftercare to ensure healthy root recovery. Some very large pines and Dawn Redwood's were also extracted. The trees were placed on landscape fabric and mulch was carefully placed around the entire root ball approximately 4 inches above the base of the trunk to assist in their recovery. Bob Grealish will be watering the material throughout 2022. We expect the mulch bed to provide an oxygen-rich medium for roots to recover. We anticipate the trees to be available for workshops in 2023. Next spring, they will be potted up in nursery containers with an appropriate potting medium.

This educational opportunity was scheduled because it was the perfect time to collect material in the field as buds are swelling. If you are interested in collecting field or landscape material and providing aftercare and you missed this field day activity, go to the website and see our video on "Aftercare for Collected Material". There

may be a little time left to collect trees that break dormancy in late spring.

Besides a financial investment by the Society, there is an ongoing investment of sweat equity. Numerous members including Karol Snead, Patty Swartz, Adam Brown, Frank Dileo, Jim Crawford, Jim Schutlz, PK, Nan Nag, Bobbie, Doug Baker, Cindie Bonomi, Larry Lamonde, Bob Grealish, Ed Baginski, Dave Metzgar, and Michael Stern volunteered their efforts from approximately 10am until 2pm. (If I missed anyone or didn't know your last name I am truly sorry.) Digging, pruning roots, sawing roots, planting, cleaning out groups up three or four branches were all the activities to set up the tree material for its bonsai journey. The time and effort put into these trees is a worthwhile investment which will lead to quality bonsai for members..

Members who participated not only learned nuances of extracting different tree species and aftercare but shared camaraderie that only in person experiences can provide. Some members also brought trees and obtained advice from experienced members on styling and when to utilize different techniques.

Everyone left smiling with the satisfaction knowing their time and efforts could benefit all the members who will get the opportunity to own one of these trees. These trees will be made available for purchase for workshops to any member on a lottery basis in 2023.

The Pittsburgh Bonsai Society as any similar organization offers countless opportunities to volunteer. When the need arises consider volunteering. The other members will benefit from your efforts and so will you. Read below.

The newer member is responsible for supplying a specimen for which they are seeking assistance. If you have tools and wire bring them along. However, the Society will have materials available.

Repotting a Deciduous Tree Video:

Our first video Aftercare of Collected Bonsai Material has been uploaded and the link is on the Pittsburgh Bonsai Society website. The password for the link will be made available to you upon request.

A new Deciduous Repot video was created to demonstrate a standard "shin based" repot of an existing deciduous bonsai. There was also a change in elevation of the root mass. This video highlights the step-by-step process of removing the tree from the original pot to securing it in a new pot with fresh soil, top dressed, and watered. The mistakes that were made along the way with anchoring the tree as well as the solution were left in the video.

The video is being edited and once it is complete it will be made available to 2022 Pittsburgh Bonsai Society members through a link on the webpage.

Bonsai Field Growing Education Program:
