Wooly Bears, Acorns and Winter Facts

I had a conversation recently with Jack Hughes, retired weatherman, about natural forecasters. Wooly caterpillars, black and brown, are viewed by some members of the public as reliable weather indicators. However, Jack said that the black and rusty bands have a lot to do with the caterpillar's age-not its forecasting ability. Similarly, the abundance of acorns has a lot to do with last spring's frost and wet weather.

(So pluck the wooly bears and acorns out of your bonsai

pots!)

Jack mentioned that Pittsburgh winter temperature averages 40 for the daytime high and 20 for the morning low. Temperatures can be plus or minus 20 degrees from these average amounts. Below zero weather is infrequent and usually lasts just a day or two. We also see a few mild periods when temperatures climb into the fifties and sixties. Snowfall averages 40 inches. The past two winters have seen above average snowfall. Perhaps we are due for a mild winter.



December is Early Winter in the bonsai calendar. If you decide to water your trees, do it early in the day. Later in the day, when temperatures drop, water turns into ice crystals and rapid expansion is powerful enough to crack or explode your bonsai pot, and the same can happen to the tree's vascular tissue.

Remove large clumps of moss, which can hold high moisture levels and harbor insects and disease.

If you are walking off the holiday pounds in the woods, keep looking for suitable rocks.

January is Mid-Winter, but it is a time of preparation. Reading books and magazines are great motivators. You can start seeds, check your supplies, especially your stock of bonsai soil and wire. Water your protected bonsai as needed. Start your list of individual tasks for each tree. Sharpen your tools now. You'll be busy in a little while.

Western Pennsylvania School for the Blind

Five children from the school have been selected to participate in the bonsai classes. These five have a combination of the highest mental and physical capabilities and live on campus. Some children commute and would not be able to participate in the evening classes. The school has students from age three to twenty-one and all are blind, have another physical impairment and have varying degrees of mental retardation.

I have no idea of what to expect from my students!

On November 1st I took several trees representing different styles of bonsai. Some had the small figures of people underneath to give the children an idea of scale. They touched the roots, moss, trunks and branches. They were upset about the leaves falling off when they touched them but I explained that this is the season for the leaves to fall, anyway. Some trees were wired so I explained about why we do that.

Afterwards, I was given a tour of the entire school. It's a wonderful facility that dates back to the turn of the century (1900) with a modern addition that includes a swimming pool, music room, and kitchen used by the students to learn cooking. On the night I was there they had just finished cooking a pound cake. The aroma filled the hallways! Sadly, I also saw a number of children who were physically deformed (as well as blind) and probably not capable of doing very many things at all. It was this image that found its way into my prayers that night.

On November 8th I will return with the trees that were donated by the Pittsburgh Bonsai Society members. The students will snip and cut and we will attempt wiring. There are two teachers from the school who will assist. I will keep you posted on our developments.
