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A Trip to the Arboretum

"Goshin"

The Arboretum in Washington D.C. has beckoned my grandson Gage and me for a long time. Gage, a bonafide member of the PBA, loves Bonsai almost as much as I do, and he is only 9 1/2. One Bonsai in particular, John Naka's "Goshin" has occupied a special place in my memory since I'd seen it last, 28 years ago; and now Gage wanted to see it. (The trip was his Christmas gift from us, which he chose instead of toys.)

I'd whetted his appetite by telling him how magnificent the entire collection was.

So over Veteran's Day weekend we finally gazed with awe at the 11 junipers that comprise "Goshin." The name means "protector of the spirit." And it indeed felt as if a spirit WAS an integral part of the composition. We both felt it. To me, it evoked the same emotion as when I walked under the giant Redwoods in Muir Woods, or stood before Picasso's "Guernica" in Madrid, or gazed across the Grand Canyon's South Rim for the first time. There are some things that, even though one looks forward to seeing them for a long time, do not disappoint!


There is a sense of reverence here; one does not speak. Gage and I wished we could miniaturize ourselves enough to walk beneath "Goshin's" trees: to live in this magic forest for only a short while would suffice.

After many minutes, we continued through the Japanese (Bonsai), Chinese (Penjing), and the N. American Pavilions

(trees like California Junipers, Buttonwoods and Pines). The International museum houses viewing stones, which traditionally are shown with Penjing and Bonsai. My favorites were the famous Chrysanthemum stone I'd seen often in magazines and the dark, ancient stone that reminded me of a mountain range with an indented lake in the foreground. Many of the stones are 250 million years old.

A lone Ginko shone lemon yellow in the sun; it seemed to greet us when we arrived. Of course most of the deciduous trees were leafless, but their trunks, branching, and root shapes can be app-

reciated more. Many of the Trident maples flaunt lovely jinned trunks. Standing healthy and happy, the oldest tree in

the collection- a Japanese white pinestill stands, aging gracefully. It's been in training for 388 years: a mere youngster!

Naka's Blue Atlas Cedar is outstanding also. And on and on and on...I won't even attempt to describe the collection of Bonsai or the quiet courtyards that surround it. One must see it for themselves.

November Meeting Winterizing Techniques for Beginners Plus Elections!!!

About 25 people took advantage of the last General Meeting of 2013 to vote for next year's Officers and Directors, garner critiques for their "problem trees", utilize different techniques for winterizing and to absorb some new styling tips for pines.

Elections: a unanimous vote for the 2014 slate of Officers and Directors. The full slate appears in this issue. Cindie urged members to mail their reservations quickly to make the December 9th deadline for the Holiday Party, while Inga is looking for a co-administrator for our Facebook Page. Dave said he will update the Website through the Dec-Jan-Feb period. A guest, who Googled "Pittsburgh-Bonsai", discovered our website and Facebook page. Martin van de Kettery, from the Netherlands, described the level of Bonsai interest in Holland (very little) and Belgium (much higher). He's impressed with Bonsai in Pittsburgh.





MEMBERS' TREES: Brandon Arroyo submitted a small boxwood and a large piece of schist. He wanted comments on his concept of placing the boxwood within a small depression in the schist. Many given, including changing the rock's orientation.















Frank DiLeo's x Mike Stern Scots pine needed a new direction. Suggestions came while Bob Grealish demonstrated "cleaning up" the tree through needle reduction. Jim Martin brought in a juniper with three distinct foliage areas and received some tips from Dave Metzgar to reduce the "pom-pom" effect, flattening out the foliage into true pads.





The appearance of Cliff Domasky's "Blue Moss Juniper" was well received; especially the exposed roots. Bob Grealish said it looked like an

old, struggling mountain tree. Cliff was encouraged to let the mossy streamers grow long for additional aging.

November Meeting

Winterizing Techniques for Beginners Plus Elections!!!

ADVANCED STYLING: Bob Grealish brought in five pines as styling examples. A 40+ year old white pine had been grafted onto a black pine, a common practice in Japan. Like the others, it was heavily wired. A Scots pine had been constantly trimmed and wired, resulting in very small needles. His x Behrenberg white pine had not been grafted, was over 35 years old, had been wired to create foliage pads. The next Scots pine had been extensively wired to create both "flow" and age. The final Scots pine had a thick branch repositioned by Bob and Dan Yobp using a length of re-bar and a padded block, with wire to secure the bend. One bent the top while the other continuously tightened the wire. Dan Yobp described his juniper's origin as "Urban Yamadori" (collected from curbside detritus). He decided to leave the broken lower branches as jins and shari. To achieve a radical bend in a straight trunk, Dan embedded two wires in the trunk, used cuts to aid the bend, and applied raffia to prevent cracking. The final bend was firmly anchored by wire. Dan quoted Bob Grealish "Wiring is Bonsai's Paintbrush".

WINTERIZATION: The wide-ranging discussion covered storage, watering, no exposure to sun and moist air. Bob Grealish revealed his deciduous trees go into storage the weekend before Thanksgiving and remain until the first weekend in April. The pines generally go on the ground, on top of a thick layer of mulch. Bob is experimenting this year with a "40-degree room". He said that most people do well by placing bonsai next to the shadiest side of the house, shielded from wind and heavy rain/snow. Simple protection is achieved with the use of shallow trenches or beds, heavy mulch and using old windows as effective lean-tos. Gradual reduction in watering from twice a week, to once a week, to once a month. Individual questions from members were answered, and many vowed to put that information to work THIS weekend.
