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### A Note From Bob:


Trimming, trimming, trimming... and weeding. Boy, things are really growing this year. Here are some tips on trimming. Many trees like maples and zelkovas can be trimmed with your fingers. When the new leaves come out, pinch them off or cut the tender new branch with your thumbnail. This only works, however, if the tree is already the shape you want and you're just maintaining a finished bonsai. Pinching is also best for junipers, chamaecyparis, spruce and larch because it prevents cutting across needles or leaves, so the ends don't turn brown. If you shear a juniper with scissors, the whole area will be spotted with distracting brown foliage. Try it some time.

To trim with scissors, cut close to the leaf behind what you are removing. Always leave green leaves or needles, because the good buds are there. Only some deciduous trees and azaleas respond to "stumping". If you cut a branch on an evergreen without leaving some green, the branch usually dies. When you trim, first remove the branches that are growing straight up or down, and those that are crossing others. Clean off the bottom of the foliage pads and shape the tops. Create spaces for the mind to fly through, bigger spaces at the bottom and smaller at the top of the tree. When you are trimming, try looking just at the spaces between branches. Design the spaces with your scissors and ignore the "self-sameness" and it is a property of natural systems that produce themselves by simple iterative (repeating) processes. If the spaces are not consistently self-same, the tree will look unnatural. In a sense, making spaces is a process of becoming one with the tree. The space is not tree and it's not you. You and the tree are working together to create space.

Weeding is not a Zen process for me. I started using Roundup recently, with good results. Some pots were so covered with arinaria I would have needed a Mantis to get them out. I applied normal strength Roundup with a sponge dampened in it. Two weeks later, the arinaria and other weeds came out easily. I also scraped the surface of the soil to remove the mushy dead arinaria roots, then dressed it up with fresh soil. When the new weeds come up (and they will), I'm going to try a foam brush to paint the Roundup on. Remember, do not get Roundup on your tree's leaves, even a little bit. If you do, rinse it off immediately and it will be OK. Roundup on the weeds or in the soil won't hurt the tree unless it is concentrated. Nevertheless, I am not recommending this process, I'm just telling you my recent experience.
