Auction Preparation

Preparing your auction items is similar to the process for the Spring Show: remove any growths from the soil and do cosmetic pruning for shape if it's a mature bonsai. Leave wiring in place if it is not marking the trunk or branches. Water the bonsai the day before the auction and let it drain well. Wipe the pot. If you are donating tools, make sure they are clean. Clean book jackets and dust your magazines. Polish bonsai pins and jewelry with a soft cloth.

To sell anything at the auction you must fill out the official PBS Auction Form. The Treasurer will have the forms available at the July 15, 2015 PBS meeting. If you want a certain reserve price, put it down, but be realistic. Remember, only PAID members can sell material.

To help the auctioneers, please print your name and identify your item on a card. The plant species and cultivar name would be especially helpful.

Bring your trees, etc., between 10:00 and 11:00am; the auction starts shortly thereafter, and we will conclude by 3:00pm.

Finally, the Society will receive 15% of the final bid on each item, but if you can donate the item, you'll be helping our future Society activities.

Second Tree Planting at Bob Grealish's

On Saturday, June 6, eleven dedicated members of the Pittsburgh Bonsai Society came to Bob Grealish's farm in order to plant more trees in the field next to his home. It was a good day for planting, cool and overcast. And of course, the morning was replete with the fragrance of fresh country air, complete with manure.

Of the approximately 150 trees planted in May, the junipers are doing well. Some of the deciduous species have died, and were replaced on Saturday. The pines, which include bare root Scotch pines, are struggling.

There were approximately 100 new trees planted, some of which replaced trees that had died from the planting last month. The volunteers planted Variegated Elm, Hinoki Cypress, Cork Bark Chinese Elm, Shimpaku Juniper, Trident Maple, and Field Maple. The weed fabric between the rows was repositioned and tacked down with metal brackets.

Following the work, everyone headed inside for some hot dogs and accompanying spread, courtesy of Bob's wife, Rose. Thanks to everyone who participated!
