JULY AUCTION

Come to the auction with your auction form filled out. (See Pittsburgh Bonsai Society web page under Resources to print a form or print it out from this newsletter on page 21) Have your items tagged. Tags will be available at the July meeting.

Finding quality bonsai material is always a challenge. Only members can sell trees, but the public can bid and purchase. Members should bring trees around 9:00am. All items must be checked in before the start of the auction. If an item is checked in it cannot be removed from the auction. People cannot trade their items after they are checked in. The auction should start at approximately 10am. There will be no lunch break, so bring a snack and something to drink. The auction serves as a fundraiser for the Pittsburgh Bonsai Society.

A reserve price on the sheet is the minimum price you will accept for the tree. If the bid does not reach your reserve, the tree will not be sold. You cannot back out of the bid.

Items must have a minimum of \$10 in value. Consider grouping small items into a package.

Material for the auction should be bonsai-related such as trees and pots and magazines. Plant material that is either diseased, dying, dead or otherwise unhealthy will not be auctioned. Clean your nursery pots and remove weeds, etc. The auction officers/volunteers will decide if the material is bonsai-related or in healthy condition and appropriate to auction.

Procedures:

Payments are required before items are removed. Payments by credit card 4% or PayPal at 5% up charge. Only members can pay by check. Anyone can pay cash.

























Your Trees In July

July is upon us. The heat is rising. The days are muggy. Most of the foliage has hardened off. Though trees are using water, they tend to use less water during this time of the year because the leaves have hardened off and there is high humidity. Trees may use less water, so be careful that you do not overwater them.

If the cambium layer on your junipers has solidified, this may be a time to begin working on your

junipers. Junipers tend to thrive in temperatures in the low 90s. If they are healthy, they like lots of sun and heat. Pines also do well with these elevated temperatures. Elongating species like spruces, larches, hemlocks, etc. may benefit from shade or partial shade in the afternoon. Also,

deciduous trees can also benefit from shade or partial shade in the afternoon. Japanese maples are trees that benefit from shade in the afternoon. Elms tend to be more

tolerant of sun and heat.

Generally, the needs for fertilization are minimal during hot summer months.

This is a time you should be aware of Japanese beetles. Some systemics, such as Sevin and Bayer Advanced 3 IN 1, are products that when absorbed by the foliage can kill the beetles as they eat the leaves.




Our Membership is Growing

The Bonsai Society grows trees in the field to provide reasonably priced, quality pre-bonsai for our workshops. The Growing Field Director, Dave Metzger, will be scheduling dates throughout the year for members to come together and have hands-on experience with these trees. The timing and technique of setting structure, pruning, wiring, bending, and trimming of these trees is based on the same schedule as your own bonsai. Since many members do not have lots of trees on which to practice, the field provides the opportunity to see how and when specific techniques are applied on multiple trees and different species.
