



September Thoughts

As of approximately August 15th, trees turn to the vascular growth phase. This can come earlier or later depending on the species of tree and weather. This means that the trees' roots are thickening and elongating. Trunks and branches are thickening as well as wounds are healing. Buds are also setting and swelling. The tree is storing sugars and starches preparing to be a bigger tree next year.



Keep a constant eye on wire biting into your branches. When you remove wire, you do not have to remove the entire piece of wire if it is not biting in.

This is the second-best time of the year to do primary structural work on junipers, Pines, and spruces. Since the trees are increasing their vascular growth, they have the capacity to heal more quickly from aggressive bends. If you remove a significant amount of foliage from your tree at this time of the year, you must protect it from freezing during the winter as you will reduce its winter hardiness.

The caveat to doing structural work at this time of the year on the above type trees depends on whether the tree was recently repotted. If the tree was repotted in the spring and it was an

aggressive repot, then wait. Though there has been some root growth since spring, the primary root

growth will be occurring now through the end of fall. It would be safer waiting until the spring to work on trees that were repotted this spring. Remember, trees benefit from only experiencing one major assault a year. Also only work on trees that have a healthy amount of foliage. This is not a time to be doing reduction on deciduous trees. If you remove foliage, the tree will attempt to regrow foliage. The new growth will not have time to harden off before the first freeze.

Depending on what you are trying to accomplish, continuing fertilization through the fall is advised. Trees that are in development can be fed more heavily than trees in refinement. When a tree is in refinement, your goal is smaller leaves and internodes. Heavy fertilization can create too much stored energy and blow out that refined growth next spring. If you decandled your multiflush pines (Japanese red, Japanese black, and pitch pines) continue to not fertilize, as you will get longer needle growth on the new shoots that formed post June decandling. The new growth has not hardened off yet because of their delayed emergence and the needles can continue to elongate. (In mid-to late-August, if you did not decandle, you can cut the new shoots on multiflush JBP and JRP to a desired length and leave some new needles. Buds should form at the cut site. I am not sure how pitch pine would react to this technique.
